I. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

SUBJECT: Request for approval of an UAB Master Plan Amendment

and the approval of the location, character, and extent of a

new 21,000 s.f., single floor laboratory facility.

APPLICANT: Brian Templeton, Director of Planning, Design, and

Construction at UAB

PREMISES: The facility is located on Block 744 bounded by University

Boulevard to the north, 9th Avenue South to the south, 22nd Street South to the west, and 23rd Street South to the east.

Senior Planner Heather Garrison introduced the case and Brian Templeton, Director of Planning, Design, and Construction at UAB, gave a brief presentation.

Chairman Morrison asked if there were any questions. Commissioner Pilkerton asked why they were using cream colored brick to which Mr. Templeton responded that it matches the nearby Southern Research Institute's (SRI's) buildings for continuity.

Commissioner Taylor made a motion to approve the case as presented. Commissioner Gunn seconded the motion. Commissioner Schrader recused himself from this case. The following resolution was approved:

WHEREAS, the proposed Genomics Diagnostic Laboratory (GDL) will integrate and house several existing UAB Hospital laboratories and will accommodate a comprehensive clinical test menu facility; and

WHEREAS, the proposed GDL facility will provide new opportunities and efficiencies by consolidating existing diagnostic testing and services, and the anticipated development of new tests and services; and

WHEREAS, the GDL will benefit the health of residents in the Birmingham area, the State of Alabama, and rural communities by helping to address certain health disparities and needs that were identified during the Covid-19 pandemic response; and

WHEREAS, this project includes the construction of a new state-of-the-art genomic laboratory facility offering existing and new diagnostic tests and services for UAB Hospital, affiliated entities, as well as outside healthcare providers from around the state and region; and

WHEREAS, the project will provide approximately 21,000 s.f. of laboratory, laboratory support, office and administrative, and building support space, in a single-story facility to house research and staff their programs; and

WHEREAS, the Subdivision Committee approved the resurvey of the site on March 8, 2023 (SUB2023-00013); and

WHEREAS, the Southside Neighborhood Association reviewed and unanimously approved the requested UAB Master Plan Amendment and the proposed GDL project on Thursday, June 15, 2023; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Birmingham Planning Commission that the request for the approval of the UAB Master Plan Amendment and approval of the location, character, and extent of improvements associated with the Genomic Diagnostic Laboratory Facility is hereby approved as illustrated in the document entitled "University of Alabama At Birmingham – Genomic Diagnostic Laboratory", dated July 5, 2023.

VI. PARKING REFORM - STAKEHOLDER WORKING GROUP

Principal Planner Michael Ward described the makeup of the stakeholder working group. He then expressed that the vote was to create the stakeholder group and to accept the meetings and workshops that were planned. Mr. Ward also explained that the group was comprised of members with expertise in parking that are committed to the city.

Chairman Morrison asked if there were any volunteers. Counciler Abbott, Vice-Chairman Dr. Black, Commissioner Jordan, and Chairman Morrison volunteered as representatives of the commission. Additional discussion provided Commissioner Pilkerton, Commissioner Gunn, and Commissioner Taylor to volunteer as alternates.

Chairman Pro-Tem Colson Lewis asked if this group is set in stone or could we look at including environmental groups. Principal Planner Michael Ward responded that we could look into it.

Commissioner Gunn asked if the Commission would see the final list when determined to which Mr. Ward responded yes.
